





Eden Malcolm lies in a bed, unable to move or speak, imprisoned in his own mind. His wife Mary spends every day on the sofa in his hospital while their daughter, whom Eden has never met, stays at home with her grandmother, all waiting for Eden's inevitable death. And he will never again see the friend and fellow soldier who didn't make it back home—and who narrates the novel. But on Christmas, the one day Mary is not at his bedside, Eden's re-ordered consciousness comes flickering alive. As he begins to find a way to communicate, some troubling truths about his marriage—and about his life before he went to war—come to the surface. Is Eden the same man he once was: a husband, a friend, a father-to-be? What makes a life worth living?

A piercingly insightful, deeply felt meditation on loyalty and betrayal, love and fear, *Waiting for Eden* is a tour-de-force of profound humanity.

Histories and personalities collide in this literary tour-de-force about the Philippines' present and America's past by the PEN Open Book Award-wining author of *Gun Dealer's Daughter*.

Two women, a Filipino translator and an American filmmaker, go on a road trip in Duterte's Philippines, collaborating and clashing in the writing of a film script about a massacre during the Philippine-American War. Chiara is working on a film about an incident in Balangiga, Samar, in 1901, when Filipino revolutionaries attacked an American garrison, and in retaliation American soldiers created "a howling wilderness" of the surrounding countryside. Magsalin reads Chiara's script and writes her own version. *Insurrecto* contains within its dramatic action two rival scripts from the filmmaker and the translator—one about a white photographer, the other about a Filipino schoolteacher.

Within the spiraling voices and narrative layers of *Insurrecto* are stories of women—artists, lovers, revolutionaries, daughters—finding their way to their own truths and histories. Using interlocking voices and a kaleidoscopic structure, the novel is startlingly innovative, meditative, and playful.

Gina Apostol is author of *Gun Dealer's Daughter, Bibliolepsy,* and *The Revolution According to Raymundo Mata.* Her essays and stories have appeared in *The New York Times* and *Los Angeles Review of Books,* among others. She grew up in the Philippines and now resides in New York City.

In *The Bear and the Nightingale*, inspired by Russian fairy tales, a young woman's family is threatened by forces both real and supernatural. 



At Bailey Academy, one of the most prestigious boarding schools in the country, Ben falls under the tutelage of Pierre LaVerdere, a brilliant, enigmatic teacher who instructs his charges on how to discuss current events, how to think about art and literature, and how to form opinions for themselves. Ted Chiang has won four Nebula awards, four Hugo awards, the John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer, and four Locus awards. His short story "Story of Your Life" was the basis of the film *Arrival*.

It's 1971 when Louise leaves Oregon for Dusseldorf, a city grappling with its nation's recent history, to study art. Soon she's embroiled in a scene dramatically different from the one at home, thanks in large part to Dieter, a mercurial musician. Their romance ignites quickly, but life gets in the way: an unplanned pregnancy, hasty marriage, the tense balance of their creative ambitions, and—finally, fatally—a family secret that shatters Dieter, and drives Louise home.

Years later, she's headed to Dieter's mother's funeral. She never returned to Germany, and has since remarried, had another daughter, and built a life in Oregon. As she flies into the heart of her past, she reckons with the choices she made, and the ones she didn't, just as her family—current and former—must consider how Louise's life has shaped their own, for better and for worse.

Heidi Diehl's writing has appeared in the *Colorado Review, Crazyhorse, Indiana Review, Mississippi Review, Witness*, and elsewhere. She received her MFA from Brooklyn College and has won fellowships from the MacDowell Colony, the Saltonstall Foundation, and the Vermont Studio Center. She lives in Brooklyn.

What is democracy, really? What do we mean when we use the term? And can it ever truly exist? Astra Taylor, hailed as a "New Civil Rights Leader" by the Los Angeles Times, provides surprising answers.

There is no shortage of democracy, at least in name, yet it is in crisis everywhere we look. From a cabal of thriving plutocrats in the White House to gerrymandering and dark-money campaign contributions, it is clear that the principle of government by and for the people is not living up to its promise.





The story of how America's most powerful corporations won our most fundamental rights and turned the Constitution into a weapon to impede the regulation of big business.

Exposing the historical origins of *Citizens United* and *Hobby Lobby*, Adam Winkler explains how those controversial Supreme Court decisions extending free speech and religious liberty to corporations were the capstone of a centuries-long struggle over corporate personhood and constitutional protections for business. Beginning his account in the colonial era, Winkler reveals the profound influence corporations had on the birth of democracy and on the shape of the Constitution itself. Once the Constitution was ratified, corporations quickly sought to gain the rights it guaranteed. The first Supreme Court case on the rights of corporations was decided in 1809, a half-century before the first comparable cases on the rights of African Americans or women. Ever since, corporations have waged a persistent and remarkably fruitful campaign to win an ever-greater share of individual rights.

Although corporations never marched on Washington, they employed many of the same strategies of more familiar civil rights struggles: civil disobedience, test cases, and novel legal claims made in a purposeful effort to reshape the law. Indeed, corporations have often been unheralded innovators in constitutional law, and several of the individual rights Americans hold most dear were first secured in lawsuits brought by big business.

Adam Winkler is a Professor of Law at UCLA. He previously authored *Gunfight: The Battle over the Right to Bear Arms in America.* His scholarship has been cited by the Supreme Court, and his writing has appeared in the *New York Times*, the *New York Review of Books*, the *Wall Street Journal, New Republic*, the *Atlantic*, the *Washington Post*, and *Slate*.
